Peacock Charger

China, Kangxi period (1662-1722)

A large Chinese porcelain 'peacock' charger, decorated in underglaze blue with a central floral medallion containing scattered peony sprays on a diaper ground. Eight lotus-petal shaped panels radiate from the centre, alternately filled with sprays of chrysanthemum, peony and lotus flowers. The wide rim has four reserved panels with baskets of peaches or pomegranates amongst leaves, alternating with four large peacocks, on a ground of scrolling chrysanthemums. The reverse has eight ribboned treasures (*zabao* 卐) around the outside rim, with a large *lingzhi* fungus 灵芝 in a double blue circle in the centre. In China the peacock is a symbol of beauty and dignity, and in the Qing dynasty, the tail feathers were used to show official rank.

These elaborate and finely executed chargers are characteristic examples of the Chinese blue-and-white porcelain

that was highly sought after in Europe during the late seventeenth and early eighteenth centuries.
